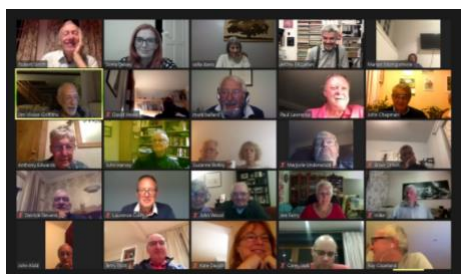

Jim Vivian-Griffiths

The Dancing Bees:
Research by Karl von Frisch on the
waggle dances of honey bees.



Jim Vivian-Griffiths, along with his wife, Val, both Master Beekeepers, have been keeping bees since 2000. They have had up to 50 colonies on home and out apiaries, but now have 28 colonies on their home apiary on a hill overlooking Monmouth and the Black mountains. They established a branch apiary for Dean Forest BKA and have run Basic and other BBKA courses for 14 years.

Jim's presentation was both informative and interesting. I thought that this particular meeting was going to be a little technical if I am honest, but Jim managed very successfully to explain not only how bees communicate essential information to one another but also the processes by which research scientists established how the process works. He talked through the history of the idea that bees communicate through vibrations and movement, and how the 'Waggle Dance' actually works. Bees use the dance not only to find nectar and pollen but also water and when in swarming mode they use the dance to reach a consensus on the best location of a new home. He also demonstrated how bees may find an abundant food source by at first, random exploration but when they return to pass information on to other bees, they always took a direct route to the best source. Sugar content is the major stimulus and bees will use the source that is nearest and most productive. Not only clever but very efficient as well; although if the source is very rich, bees have been observed flying some 9 miles to forage such as heather. Bees will also bring back a range of pollen as they need a balanced diet. Adjacent hives often bring in different pollens depending on the needs of their colony.

Again, another excellent hour spent listening to a very good and well-informed speaker. Our thanks to Jim, and to Jen, Archie and Bob for setting it up and organising the event.

If you have yet to register for one of our meetings why not give it a try. It costs nothing and you don't need to go out on a cold miserable night. It only takes an hour! Go on, you never know you may even enjoy it!
